Hospital Transport Service

In November 2021 Urram took on running of the West Lochaber Hospital **Transport** Service. Previously it had been operating as a pilot and the funding ran out in the April of 2021. Following negotiations with NHS Highland and generous funding package from Peregrine Ardnamurchan Charitable Trust, Urram able to resume the service and purchase the existing leased vehicle.

Urram were aware that befriending was an area that could help residents of our areas combat social isolation and loneliness. Funding was sought from the Lottery and a partnership was embarked on with Highland Hospice.


We became aware of the need for additional group befriending opportunities and have established various tea and chat groups, lunch clubs, and yoga classes throughout the area.

Hospital Transport Service expanding to Urram Transport




Its time to retire the Berlingo from the being the main Hospital Transport vehicle. Successful funding to the Plugged in Communities Fund means we have replaced it with a Hyundai Ioniq 5, due for delivery in August 2023. We are delighted to be reducing our carbon footprint in this way.

We have developed a partnership with Sunart Community Company with support the from Community Regeneration Fund we expanding our fleet with another car based in Strontian. The community car club we are setting up will support Urram Hospital transport as well.

Oh what a laugh I have had transporting today, my sides are still aching - one of the perks of this 'job'!

13 Volunteers completed 189 journeys in 2022 covering a massive 24,086 miles.

The service is supported by NHS per mile payment and contributions from clients along with additional funding from the Peregrine Ardnamurchan Charitable Trust, Mowi, and The Robertson trust.

Tea and Chat groups in Acharacle and Ardgour meet fortnightly and we partner with Ewen's Room to run the 'Open Doors' session in Strontian.

Yoga has taken off in Treslaig with 12 regular attendees.

Partnership with Highland Hospice supports our one to one befriending service. We are delighted to be supporting 6 befriending relationships. Befrienders meet with their client on a regular basis, have conversations and build connections. If it is wished, then short outings and excursions can be undertaken too. Our partnership with Highland Hospice supports this aspect of our work.
