Report of the Trustees

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report together with the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2022.

Structure

Urram is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO), operating under the two tier structure using the SCVO model constitution.

Trustee recruitment

The maximum number of charity trustees is 13; out of that;

- No more than 5 shall be appointed annually as representatives from each of the 5 community council areas (Ardgour, Morvern, Sunart, West Ardnamurchan and Acharacle)
- Each of these representatives must be eligible to be a Member under Clause 11 but may not be a serving community councillor.
- No more than 8 shall be charity trustees who were elected/appointed under clauses 59 and 60 (or deemed to have been appointed under clause 58); and 54.3 no more than 5 shall be charity trustees who were appointed under the provisions of clauses 63 and 64.54.4.

• At no point should the number of co-opted (non-elected or appointed Trustees) exceed the total number of appointed and elected Trustees. 55 The minimum number of charity trustees is (5).

Objectives and Activities

Charitable purposes

The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage by providing information, advice, support and care services within West Lochaber, including the advancement of health.

Activities

The Trustees and employees continued to meet throughout the year with representatives of NHSH to maintain oversight and political pressure on delivery of services at Dail Mhor. Dail Mhor battled throughout the year with staffing shortages and fluctuating Covid restrictions or infection peaks in Lochaber. The Trustees remain grateful for the dedication and professionalism of local staff throughout another difficult year.

Fundraising activities – specifically £30,000 towards the study and subsequently identified 3 consultants who would tender for the Feasibility Study into Dail Mhor's future.

Continued conversations with Highland Hospice & NHSH to explore possibilities of supporting HH to develop a Homecare Service locally (Sunflower care). A recruitment drive resulted in carer applicants but after two recruitment attempts, no applicants qualified enough to take on the role of Coordinator could be found so the project was put on hold.

Conversations with Highland Hospice to investigate Urram establishing a Helping Hands Befriending Service with an annual grant from HH and Awards For all (Lottery) applied for.

During late summer 2021 initiated detailed discussions with the former coordinator of Lochaber Hospital Transport Scheme about whether Urram could resurrect the service involving detailed budgeting and meetings with NHSH regarding payments for mileage. Urram tried and failed to secure the use of the NHSH patient transport vehicle which was formally allocated to Dail Mhor but sadly this was redeployed elsewhere by NHSH before Urram could utilise it. In the February, the HTS vehicle was involved in a collision with a deer and £9,000 of damage incurred, leading to a slight hiatus in service until a replacement vehicle was sourced through the insurers.

Staffing – Lara van De Peer resigned in June to join another charity, and following thorough recruitment and selection process was replaced in October by Louise White in the development role and Natalie Rogers running befrienders. Jane Gaze was employed as Hospital Transport Coordinator in November.

Trustees – Joanne Matheson retired from the Board in September 2021 and a recruitment drive on Facebook was implemented to recruit more Directors.

2 new laptops were sourced, and the existing Urram laptop refurbished although later proved unreliable.

A policies subcommittee was established to assist staff in preparing and finalising all necessary policies and procedures.

Urram held its inaugural AGM via Zoom on the 24th January 2022 and Phil Simpson was eventually co-opted as another Trustee.

Achievements and Performance

2021-22 was the year that Urram finally began delivering direct care services via Befriending and Hospital Transport to the communities of Ardgour, Acharacle, Sunart, Morvern and West Ardnamurchan whilst continuing to work on future options for Dail Mhor. Three jobs were created in this geographically remote rural area and fundraising continued apace.

Continued to work with NHSH to ensure no let up in services at Dail Mhor. This has helped secure care jobs this side of the ferry and enabled Dail Mhor to be there for local patients stepping down from hospital or in some cases receiving end of life care. Being locally based, family members have been able to access their loved ones at such a difficult time.

Published the community consultation into the future of Dail Mhor and other care services.

Secured continued support for the employment of a part time Development Officer for Urram from NHSH.

a. Secured £30,000 for the Dail Mhor Feasibility Study. A Lottery application was unsuccessful but the following was secured;

- c. Sunart Community Benefit Fund £2,500
- d. Morvern Community Trust £2,500
- e. Highland Council Ward Discretionary Fund £3,000
- f. Highlands & Islands Enterprise £14,806
- g. NHSH £2,500
- h. Urram £2,194

Secured a grant and ongoing funding support worth over £15,000 from the Peregrine Ardnamurchan Trust to purchase the former Lochaber Hospital Transport vehicle, previously operated under a lease agreement. The service was also supported by individual donors and a grant from local employer MOWI. The service was successfully re-launched, volunteer drivers re-deployed and residents were again able to access much valued support to get to hospital appointments- mainly in Fort William and Inverness.

Selected a firm of consultants to conduct the study in January 2022.

Urram successfully secured support from Awards for All, and Highland Hospice to pilot the befriending service in Ardgour, Strontian and Acharacle. 300 flyers were printed and circulated and posters. By the end of the year four befriending services were initiated.

Registered Urram with Disclosure Scotland in order that it can process PVG certificates for all volunteers, and implemented volunteering policies, risk assessments and appropriate insurance.

Annual Accounts were prepared by the Treasurer and externally verified for 2020-21.

For 2021-22 Urram adopted Quickbooks as its chosen accounts package, the use of Sharepoint as its cloud-based document system and Canva Pro for publications.

The charity therefore consolidated its operations and prepared for a full year of delivery in 2022-23, against challenging conditions post-pandemic.

Reserves policy

The charity will aim to hold reserves equivalent to three months running costs (inclusive of redundancy payments and any other liabilities).

Some funds which may also be held in reserves may be allocated to particular projects or ringfenced as per funder requirement for multi-year projects.

Independent examiner's report to the Trustees and Members of Urram SCIO

I report on the accounts of the charity for the period ended 31st March 2022 which comprises the statement of receipts and payments, the balance sheet and the related notes.

The charity's trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1)(c)of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Account (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters.
